THE FIRST PEDIATRIC VISION SCREENING PROGRAM IN PARAGUAY A CBI PARTNER REPORT FROM DR. YASMIN BRADFIELD

As a newer Combat Blindness International (CBI) board member and pediatric ophthalmologist, I wanted to work on a project that would impact children. I traveled with the CBI team to Asunción, Paraguay to assess CBI's joint pediatric vision screening initiative with Fundación Visión (FV). Paraguay does not have vision screening requirements for children, so this program would be the first in the country.

The FV team has developed a program that trains schoolteachers to perform screenings. Children who failed a vision test received an eye examination by an ophthalmologist at a FV clinic or mobile eye van. This project started almost 2 years ago, so CBI wanted to check in to see if screenings were performed appropriately, if children received follow up eye examinations, to review data, and to hear from the Fundación Visión team about any obstacles they faced.

Over 14,000 screenings have been performed in urban and remote schools, and glasses have been prescribed to over 600 children.
One child with retinoblastoma, a malignant retinal tumor, was diagnosed and is undergoing chemotherapy in Buenos Aires.
This school screening saved his life!

We strategized ways to increase acceptance by teachers, ensure program quality, and reach children in very remote areas. We traveled to variety of schools as we observed FV's enthusiastic team (which included an ophthalmology resident) giving lectures and leading a hands-on training session for teachers at their school. We gave feedback to teachers performing the screenings, met a young girl who had strabismus surgery after failing a screening, and interacted with the mobile eye van staff. The van served as the eye clinic in rural areas, providing dilated eye examinations

and prescribing glasses to children who had failed their initial screening. It's always challenging to develop buy-in from municipalities, principals, and teachers, but the FV team has done amazing work garnering support and enthusiasm from each of these stakeholders. I was particularly impressed with the organization, dedication, and camaraderie of the entire FV screening team.


Finally, we met with a Ministry of Health ophthalmologist who is introducing legislation that requires mandatory vision screening for school children. What fortuitous timing! I am hopeful it will pass, so CBI and Fundación Visión can work together with local municipalities until every child across Paraguay is screened. I am grateful to contribute to this effort. It opened my eyes to the ways CBI collaborates with different partners, the impact CBI is having on pediatric eye care, and the real need for quality pediatric eye care in countries like Paraguay and around the world.
