While alleviating preventable blindness through cost-effective cataract surgeries and screening children in school will always be at the center of our work, in 2023, CBI continued to develop and grow programs and initiatives with a consistent emphasis on sustainability.

In 2023, CBI proudly extended its support for both the Certified Ophthalmic Paramedic Fellowship Program (COP) and the Aadya Initiative, with the goals of championing educational and career pathways for women while cultivating a sustainable workforce in underserved regions and ensuring access to quality, equitable eye care. This expansion marks a significant stride towards securing the long-term success of our initiatives, as we actively collaborate with other CBI partners in India to replicate these impactful programs, amplifying our reach.

In 2023, we forged a partnership with the Madison Metropolitan School District and began development of a new Mobile Vision Van Program. This initiative is dedicated to ensuring that our children receive the essential vision care they require, thus preventing any from slipping through the cracks.

For the woman in India receiving an eye screening for the first time, the man in Kenya regaining his sight after a free cataract surgery, the young child in Madison, Wisconsin, whose screening and glasses allow them to see the chalkboard, and the woman in India whose education and training means she can be financially independent, we are committed to providing limitless opportunities for better vision and brighter futures.

As we enter our 40th year of service, we continue to be deeply humbled by your unwavering support. Your generosity and enthusiasm fuels our mission and makes all these achievements possible. ## INNOVATION IN ACTION: THE AADYA INITIATIVE

## The Aadya Initiative

In 2023, CBI continued to grow the Aadya Initiative in collaboration with Dr Shroff's Charity Eye Hospital (SCEH) in New Delhi, India. Born out of the pandemic and the need to decentralize mass vision screening, the Aadya Initiative is a unique program that identifies, selects, and trains local women from rural villages in India. These women are employed and deployed back into their village to administer free eye health exams door to door within their communities. Through this program we are working to increase rural women's access to education and training, increase their financial independence, positively impact women's poverty levels, and provide role models and mentors for other young women in rural communities, all while providing free eye care to everyone.

In October of 2023, our 83 Aadya screeners in Saharanpur and Vrindavan completed over 1 million screenings since the inception of these programs in 2021.

"I am thrilled at the initiative and drive of these young women in providing so many underserved people access to a simple eye exam, glasses, and treatment if needed," says Reena Chandra, Executive Director of CBI. "They have taken ownership of the program and become advocates for their patients and community."

As the program grows, CBI will focus on supporting the training and education of these young women, and collaboratively with SCEH, we will seek additional partners to support the stipends of these young women.



Ms. Sheetal Kumari's inspiring journey from a small village in Uttar Pradesh to becoming an integral part of Dr. Shroff's Charity Eye Hospital's efforts to combat blindness showcases remarkable determination and compassion. Despite facing limited resources and familial obligations, Sheetal prioritized her family's needs over her education, working as a blood collection personnel. However, upon learning about the Aadya Initiative at the hospital, she seized the opportunity, undergoing rigorous training in eye care.

Since then, Sheetal has conducted screenings for over 17,000 individuals, facilitated 41 cataract surgeries, and distributed near vision glasses to over 90 individuals, significantly improving their quality of life. Additionally, she actively mentors and trains new screeners, strengthening the healthcare workforce and empowering others to join the fight against blindness.

Her new role has also elevated Sheetal's status within her family, granting her inclusion in decision-making processes. Sheetal's journey exemplifies resilience and underscores the potential for meaningful change through compassion and service, making her a pivotal figure in combating blindness.

## The Certified Ophthalmic Paramedic (COP) Program

In low-income countries, the severe shortage of eye care professionals is a major obstacle to providing care to those who need it the most.

Since 2014, Combat Blindness International (CBI) has supported training young women as eye health technicians through the Certified Ophthalmic Paramedic Program (COP) at Dr. Shroff's Charity Eye Hospital (SCEH) in New Delhi, India. Today, these bright, engineering women represent 80% of the entire SCEH workforce, serving in roles such as ophthalmic nursing assistants, vision technicians, medical record administrators, and patient counselors. The COPs have become indispensable pillars of SCEH, increasing the hospital's capacity to screen and treat patients while providing a more personalized experience for the patient.



In mid-2023, the Certified Ophthalmic Paramedic Program achieved sustainability as SCEH absorbed the COPs' training and stipend costs into their operating budget, a goal pursued since the program's inception in 2013. As a result, CBI is now focusing on the COP Fellowship program, a 1-2 year program allowing promising students further study and training in administration, patient counseling, clinical care, or surgical care, fostering career advancement opportunities as many fellows progress to become trainers, unit managers, and supervisors. Additionally, many continue to pursue advanced degrees such as nursing and optometry. SCEH recognized the value of this advanced training and placement of COPS Fellows throughout the SCEH network, as rural patients are increasingly accessing regional surgical centers more than the primary hospital in New Delhi.

## Building a Future: Portrait of a COP Student

Tanvi's journey, beginning in 2019, as a Certified Ophthalmic Paramedic (COP) at Dr. Shroff's Charity Eye Hospital (SCEH) in New Delhi, India, illustrates the profound impact of education and opportunity. Despite early hardships, including the loss of her father, Tanvi's resilience and determination propelled her to excel in the program, earning her an Appreciation Certificate. From a shy student, to a confident counselor and patient educator, Tanvi now leads a retinoblastoma project, providing essential eye care to children. Her aspirations include pursuing a Master's in Hospital Administration, aiming to become a hospital administrator and eye care manager. Tanvi's story highlights how empowering women through education can have a profound impact on their lives and the people they serve.

## The International Cataracts Program

Combat Blindness International's International Cataracts Program is the cornerstone of our mission, driven by the urgent global need for vision restoration. With cataracts persisting as a leading cause of blindness worldwide, our commitment to addressing this challenge remains unwavering. Nearly 100 million individuals worldwide suffer from cataracts, representing 39.55% of total blindness<sup>1</sup>. In India, the challenge is particularly acute, where 62.6 million people are visually impaired, with cataracts being the primary cause of blindness at 62.6%<sup>2</sup>.

In the past year, our efforts have yielded significant results. Through extensive screening initiatives, we reached over 1,000,000 individuals, identifying those afflicted by cataracts and in need of assistance. Moreover, we're proud to



have supported over 20,788 sight-saving cataract surgeries in 2023, offering renewed vision and hope to those who previously lived in darkness.

Combat Blindness International's International Cataracts Program remains steadfast in its commitment to combating blindness, one surgery, one screening, and one transformed life at a time. Through our resolute commitment and collaborative partnerships, we continue to make strides toward a world where preventable blindness is a thing of the past.

It wasn't until she visited the Lions SightFirst Eye Hospital Camp she discovered her vision was the culprit, with a mature cataract in her left eye and an early one in her right. Following successful surgeries on both eyes, Hannah expressed her gratitude and optimism, eager to return to her work with restored vision and renewed confidence in her ability to thrive.

## The International Pediatric Program

At Combat Blindness International, we recognize that vision serves as more than just a sense, it's a gateway to opportunity, especially for children. Our International Pediatric Screening Program stands as a fundamental aspect of our mission, ensuring that children worldwide receive essential eye care to secure a brighter future.

Our recent trip to Paraguay signifies a significant milestone in our global efforts to provide crucial pediatric eye care. Collaborating with Fundación Visión, we initiated the country's first-ever pediatric vision screening program, addressing a critical gap in children's healthcare. Through this initiative, over 14,000 screenings have been conducted across rural and remote schools, resulting in remarkable outcomes.

Research underscores that 80% of learning occurs visually during a child's formative years. Visual impairments can significantly impede a child's ability to learn and develop essential skills, potentially hindering their



academic and social progress. Through our screening program, we proactively identify and address visual issues early, ensuring children have the necessary tools to excel academically and beyond.

Furthermore, vision plays a pivotal role in a child's overall health. Undetected visual impairments can exacerbate existing health conditions or lead to new complications, posing potential risks to a child's life. By providing comprehensive screening and early intervention, we mitigate such risks, ensuring that children receive the care they need to thrive.

Beyond screenings, our collaboration with Fundación Visión emphasizes capacity building, including training schoolteachers to conduct screenings and providing follow-up care through mobile eye vans. This journey has reinforced the significance of CBI's collaborative approach, showcasing the transformative impact of pediatric eye care initiatives in underserved communities.

## Pediatric Screening in Paraguay

Last year, Combat Blindness International collaborated with Fundación Visión to conduct screening sessions across various locations, including the Clotilde Paredes School in San Lorenzo, near Paraguay's capital. At this school alone, approximately 200 children were screened, including the Gonzalez Morinigo brothers, Adael and Marcos. Adael, the older brother, is five years old and attends the preschool. By participating in these screenings, Adael and Marcos are sparking hope and potential, propelling themselves on a transformative path toward success and a brighter future. Their clear vision enables them to effortlessly see the chalkboard and excel in sports. As they journey into adulthood, their vision will open a world of opportunities for themselves and their families.


